CLASS DESCRIPTION

The digital age has brought a paradigm shift in business models. Today, the world's largest taxi firm does not own cars. The world's most popular social media company does not create content. The world's major retailers, have no stock and one of the world's largest accommodation provider does not own properties.

As any other paradigm shift, it raises questions Are these new companies service providers; thus, regulated under their sector-specific regulations? Are there just mere digital platforms that provide intermediary services; thus, regulated under the electronic commerce regulations? What are the different interests at stake? Consumers, and traditional service providers are just some them. A deep understanding of each of these new companies' business models is crucial when answering these questions.

A "new game" requires new rules which is what will be addressed in this class. Whether you want to provide corporate counsel, to start your own business or be involved in policy making processes, this class will provide you with the necessary tools to critically asses the regulatory implications of these digital-based new business models and of the sharing economy.

- **Conceptual (knowing)**: This subject will provide students with a general knowledge of the normative framework and the main challenges of EU regulations on new business models. In particular, the students will review the most up to date EU regulations with a multidisciplinary approach (legal aspects of EU information society services, EU Internal market services regulations and competition legal aspects of new business models).
- **Procedural (doing)**: The students will develop the type of skills required to work in law firms, corporations or public institutions. The aim is to provide students with the necessary tools to critically assess the latest EU regulatory framework on new business models from a practical perspective and its future development.
- **Professional (knowing how)**: The students will have to produce reports and defend their cases in the same way as in a professional environment.

Once submitted, the parties will have to defend their cases orally before their fellow judges. At the end of the trial, the judges will have one week to pass a ruling.
