INDIVIDUAL / GROUP WORK: Speaking Skills (30%), (cannot be retaken) 2 Reading seminars (10% each) Reading Seminar 1: in group, reading a text and answering some questions Reading 2: individual, reading a tale aloud and giving feedback to classmates. 2 Presentations (5% each) - In pairs. If a member fails to show up on the presentation date, the other member will have to present the topic individually to be assessed. - Memorization and failing to answer questions will result in a failing mark. - Presentations in pairs must last a specific time and students must share out the time given. If the pair does not meet the time criteria, the students will be penalized (-1). - Attendance to peers' presentations is compulsory. - Compulsory attendance is required when preparing the presentations in class. If a student fails to attend, he/she will only be able to get the minimum standards (5/10). - Written notes are not allowed when speaking skills are assessed.
