METODOLOGÍA DOCENTE

Aspectos metodológicos generales de la asignatura

The course "War and Peace in the 21st Century" will be taught in person and online.

The professor will give in-person classes on the different course contents. In addition to these classes, teaching will be enriched with the analysis of case studies, joint commentary of the required readings, and guest lectures. The active participation of the students in the in person sessions will be encouraged and evaluated.

The students will also be required to make a detailed study of the readings and case studies assigned by the professor throughout the course.
