 INDIVIDUAL / GROUP WORK: Speaking Skills (30%), (cannot be retaken) Compulsory attendance is required when preparing the presentations in class. If a student fails to attend, he/she will only be able to get the minimum standards (5/10). Written notes are not allowed when speaking skills are assessed. 2 Presentations In pairs. If a member fails to show up on the presentation date, the other member will have to present the topic individually to be assessed. Notes are not allowed. Memorization and failing to answer questions will result in a failing mark. Presentations in pairs must last a specific time and students must share out the time given. If the pair does not meet the time criteria, the students will be penalized (-1). Attendance to peers' presentations is compulsory. 	 Aspects to be assessed: Quality and clarity of information.
