METHODOLOGY

The comprehensive learning of any historical and geographical subject requires a necessary effort of personal discovery on the part of the student, duly supervised by the professor. The professor is primarily responsible for lectures, support, and academic supervision; however, the student is responsible for active participation in their own learning, the assimilation of topics, and the development of their own critical thinking. To this end, each student must participate in collaborative projects, present a group project in class, and participate in discussions. They may also complete freely chosen optional assignments with the help of the professor. This method not only aims to develop skills specific to the subject area, but also those generic to the degree/course listed above. The limited number of contact hours allocated to this subject requires strict control over time allocation. Taking all this into account, a tight schedule has been developed that assigns each week to the study of a specific topic.

- To be able to take the final exam, students must not have missed more than one third of the classes without justification. If this requirement is not met, the student may lose the right to be assessed both in the ordinary and extraordinary assessment period (art. 93-1 of the General Regulations). Failure to attend to the first hour of a two-hour lecture, means having missed the whole session in terms of attendance, regardless of whether or not the student the second hour.
