SHORT DESCRIPTION

This course explores the geopolitics of Europe, tracing the continent's long evolution of conflict and cooperation through key historical and contemporary events. It covers a wide array of themes that have defined its identity and realities, including Ancient Greece and Rome, Christianity, the emergence of the modern state system, the Age of Exploration and Empire, revolutions, the rise of nationalism, and war. In addition, we explore the post-1945 development of the European Union, examining its origins, motivations, structure, functioning, milestones, and setbacks. Finally, the course reflects on the current state of Europe and its most significant challenges and opportunities for the future. Through comprehensive lectures and engaging discussions, students will gain an in-depth understanding of the forces shaping the continent's past and present geopolitics.

SUB-THEMES: ECONOMIC INTEGRATION, THE SINGLE MARKET, MONETARY UNION AND EURO, TRADE, ECONOMIC DISPARITIES AND COHESION, LABOR MARKET AND EMPLOYMENT, FINANCIAL CHALLENGES, INNOVATION AND COMPETITIVENESS, THE GREEN ECONOMY, COOPERATION AND COMPETITION WITH THE US, CHINA, JAPAN, AND INDIA

TOPIC 11: MIGRATION AND BORDERS IN EUROPE

SUB-THEMES: IMMIGRANTS, REFUGEES, INTERNAL FREE MOVEMENT, EXTERNAL BORDER SECURITY AND MANAGEMENT, THIRD-COUNTRY NATIONALS, ASYLUM, HUMAN TRAFFICKING AND IRREGULAR MIGRATION, THE EXTERNALIZATION OF IMMIGRATION POLICY, HUMAN RIGHTS, SOLIDARITY AND BURDEN-SHARING, PARTY POLITICS, THE FAR RIGHT

TOPIC 12: EUROPEAN FOREIGN POLICY

SUB-THEMES: JOSEPH NYE, SOFT AND HARD POWER, EUROPEAN DEFENSE COMMUNITY, CFSP, ESDP, TRANSATLANTIC RELATIONS AND NATO, EU RELATIONS WITH RUSSIA, EU RELATIONS WITH CHINA, ENP, TRADE AND ECONOMIC DIPLOMACY, INTERNATIONAL AID AND DEVELOPMENT, HUMAN RIGHTS AND DEMOCRACY PROTECTION, CLIMATE DIPLOMACY, CRISIS MANAGEMENT, STRATEGIC AUTONOMY, ENERGY SECURITY

TOPIC 13: CURRENT AND FUTURE GEOPOLITICAL CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN EUROPE

METHODOLOGY

This course titled The Political Geography of Europe will be taught in person. The professor will deliver a series of lectures on as many of the key themes above as time permits. This will be enriched by student contributions (questions, commentaries, discussions, presentations) inside the classroom as well as readings, research and writing outside.
